## Rationale

### The World is Ours to Explore

All children have a right to a broad, balanced and relevant education which provides continuity and progression and takes individual differences into account. The curriculum at Church Aston Infant School is constructed on the principles that:

- work in school should be designed to meet the requirements of the National Curriculum
- the school curriculum should aim to provide opportunities for all pupils to learn and to achieve ie to know more and remember more.
- the school curriculum should aim to promote pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development including British Values and prepare all pupils for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of life.

## Curricular Aims

Church Aston Infant School aims that through our curriculum, our pupils should:

- be able to listen and read for a variety of purposes and be able to convey their meaning accurately and appropriately through speech and writing for a variety of purposes
- know how to think and solve problems mathematically in a variety of situations using concepts of number, algebra, measurement, shape and space, and handling data
- be developing an enquiring mind and scientific approach to problems
- have an opportunity to solve problems using technological skills
- be able to use ICT as a tool for information gathering, communicating, problem solving and presentation
- be capable of communicating their knowledge and feelings through various art forms including art/craft, music, drama and be acquiring appropriate techniques which will enable them to develop their inventiveness and creativity
- know about geographical, historical and social aspects of the local environment and the national heritage and be aware of other times and places and recognise links among family, local, national and international events
- have a growing knowledge of the beliefs of the some of the major world religions.
- begin acquiring a set of moral values, e.g. honesty, care, personal responsibility, respect; on which to base their own behaviour
- be developing the ability to make reasoned judgements and choices, based on interpretation and evaluation of relevant information from a variety of sources
- be developing tolerance, respect and appreciation of the feelings and capabilities of others in an unbiased way
- be developing agility, physical co-ordination and confidence in and through movement
- know how to apply the basic principles of health, hygiene and safety

The school aims to provide a range of activities across all subjects of the National Curriculum and the Foundation Stage Areas of Learning that will allow each child's potential to be fully developed.

The school's Equalities Policy, SEND Policy and SEND Offer indicate how we ensure access to the curriculum for all.

## Planning

Long, medium and short term plans are devised using:

- Foundation Stage Curriculum and Early Learning Goals
- The National Curriculum
- SACRE Agreed Syllabus for the teaching of Religious Education

Long term planning is based on a three-year cycle of half termly modules to provide variety, progression and coverage in both classes.

Medium and short term planning is objective led and adaptive teaching is used to accommodate the needs of pupils of varying ages within each group.

## Curriculum Enrichment

The school believes that the curriculum can be positively enriched by

- Using the immediate environment for research, stimulus and inspiration.
- Encouraging visits from speakers, artists and performers to share their expertise and interest with the pupils.
- Taking pupils outside the immediate environment on field trips in support of their school studies.
- Using and exploiting to the full the use of ICT available through Telford and Wrekin and links on the school website.

## Extra-Curricular Activities

The school provide extra-curricular activities for its pupils through clubs eg sports and art, cluster events for example The Newport Big Sing. Events and activities planned in conjunction with Friends of School such as Feast for a King to celebrate the coronation with the community.
